**Carolyn Shuster Fournier** wrote an article in homage to Don Campbell ("Don

Campbell, La musique est un pont” /”Don Campbell, Music is a Bridge”) describing a concert she gave in his memory on October 22, 2013, which was just published (p. 40-41) in the review *Orgues nouvelles* n° 25 (summer 2014). At least twelve Americans crossed the Atlantic to attend this concert; the CD included with this issue includes the last two movements (*Dies Irae* and *In Paradisum*) of David Conte’s *Requiem Songs* (premiered in its entirety during this concert) and Nadia Boulanger’s *Lux Aeterna*, performed by Magali Léger, soprano, Alexis Galpérine, violon, Saori Kikuchi harp.

The L’Harmattan editions in Paris have just published Carolyn Shuster Fournier’s book, *Un siècle de vie musicale à l’église de la Trinité à Paris, de Théodore Salomé à Olivier Messiaen, (A century of musical life at the church of the Trinity in Paris; from Théodore Salomé to Olivier Messiaen)* with a preface by Michel Chapuis.

Carolyn recently performed a concert on the Clicquot/Cavaillé-Coll *Grand Orgue* at the Versailles Cathedral with her husband, Dominique Fournier (at the Cavaillé-Coll choir organ), on June 17<sup>th</sup>, that celebrated the 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Liberation of Paris (see Recitals Past and Present).

Carolyn Shuster Fournier accompanied, on the organ and the piano, the American Chorale Salute to Valor 2014, a choir with members from California, Arizona and Florida, conducted by Ed Lojeski, Darrell Rowader and Dennis Houser, with the sopranos Jacki Doxey Scott, Heidi Cissell and the mezzo-soprano Kathy Weiler Josselyn: at the Trinité Church in Paris on Thursday June 19<sup>th</sup>, at Sainte-Mère-Eglise on Saturday June 21<sup>st</sup>, and at the Bayeux Cathedral on Sunday, June 22<sup>nd</sup>. The program of this musical festival in honor of service members and veterans included Ed Lojeski’s *Missa Americana* and his *Psalms of the Passover*, R. Frances Chadwick’s *Song of Simeone*, John Leavitt’s *An American Quilt*, Molly James’ *A Farewell*, Peter Wilhousky’s *Battle*

*Hymn of the Republic*, Randall Thompson’s *Alleluia* and Jester Hairston’s *Hold on*. She also performed instrumental selections on the piano with Dianne and Philip Rammon (violins), Stephen Custer (cello), Darryl Tanikawa (clarinet), notably John Williams’ *Air and Simple Gifts*, Serge Prokofieff’s *Ouverture on Hebrew Themes* and George Gershwin’s *Promenade*.

Steve writes:

*Massimo was a very dear friend of mine. We met in 1987 when I was playing at St. Augustin Church in Paris and he was playing at the cathedral in Chartres. He played the dedication recital of the organ at St. Helena and the 10th and 15th anniversary programs, as well as several other recitals in Minneapolis and St. Paul, including two concerts at WCC. I was very fortunate to play two times on the concert series at Santa Rita in Torino and several other places in Italy, thanks to him. We have visited each other several times over the years, sometimes here, sometimes there. He and his beautiful, charming wife, Franca, even visited me at my home in the south of France. I am honored to have known him and to call him friend. He was a gentleman and a gentle man, a genius. He died of pancreatic cancer, after a very short illness, on November 12, 2013. He was 53. I would be honored if you would help me remember my friend.*

**Rhonda Edgington** submitted these recent experiences:

On a recent New England tour, I made 2 surprising European AGO connections.

In Claremont, New Hampshire, a somewhat economically depressed former mill town, I played a recital on an inauspicious instrument in a small country church. Union Episcopal Church is the oldest standing Episcopal church in New Hampshire – it is a beautiful setting, but houses a very small congregation. Expecting afterwards to speak with the usual group of supportive grandmothers of the parish, with an occasional curious parent and child set thrown into the mix, I was surprised to meet European AGO member Joseph R. Olefirowicz, who had travelled across the state to hear me play, and wanted to pass along greetings to his old friends from the chapter.

The following day, in Hanover, New Hampshire, I spied a familiar-looking couple in the audience. I finally realized I'd met them in Toulouse, France, at the

2010 Spring Meeting – Peter and Joan Beardsley! The retired Episcopal cathedral musician from Springfield, Massachusetts, Peter is just beginning an interim church musician position at the Episcopal Church in Hanover. Joan had been a helpful set of arms in 2010, as I ventured on the organ tour with a four month old baby in tow – a bit sleep-deprived and crazy, but desperately wanting to hear and play those magnificent French instruments! We enjoyed dinner after my concert in Hanover together with my host at the Church of Christ at Dartmouth College, where I'd played, and whom we found to be a mutual friend of ours.

### *Obituary*

**John Hamilton**, noted international harpsichordist, organist, and teacher of many performer/scholars in both the US and Europe, died in Copenhagen on July 15, 2014, at the age of 89.

Born in a mining village in the Rocky Mountains of Colorado, and with his first musical studies on the West Coast, his early career as a pianist culminated in scholarship study with Olga Samaroff-Stokowski in Philadelphia and New York. His prodigious intellect took him to the University of California, Berkeley, for a degree in physics, and later to the University of Southern California for advanced degrees in music.

Appointed to the faculty at the University of Oregon in 1959, Dr. Hamilton was responsible for the university acquiring numerous fine organs and harpsichords, including the three-manual organ by Jurgen Ahrend in Beal Recital Hall. As a frequent consultant to organ projects, he also figured importantly in the installation of the three-manual organ by John Brombaugh in Central Lutheran Church, immediately adjacent to the university's music complex.

While a professor at the University of Oregon, he divided his time between teaching at the university and his researches, writing and concerts in Europe and the United States. His career at that time included concert appearances at Wigmore Hall in London; Fitzwilliam Museum, Cambridge; Carnegie Recital Hall, New York; and in Frankfurt, Hamburg, Bremen, Basel, Copenhagen, Paris, San Francisco, and Dallas. He also played for Radio Switzerland, Radio Denmark, trans-Canada radio, the Soro Organ Festival in Denmark, San Francisco television, and two national meetings of the American Guild of Organists.

Dr. Hamilton is survived by his long-time partner, Erik Hedegaard; services and burial will take place in Copenhagen.

## AGO RECOGNIZES TWO AWARD WINNING COMPOSERS

New York. The AGO honored two award winning composers at its Annual Meeting on Tuesday, June 24, during the AGO National Convention in Boston, Mass. AGO President Eileen Guenther presided over the award presentations to **Libby Larsen** of Minneapolis, Minn., and to **Ivan Božičević** of Croatia.

The 2014 **Distinguished Composer Award** was presented to **Libby Larsen**. The prestigious award, created in 1986, is presented biennially to recognize outstanding composers of organ and choral music in the United States. Previous award recipients include: Virgil Thomson, Ned Rorem, Daniel Pinkham, Samuel Adler, Dominick Argento, William Albright, Conrad Susa, Emma Lou Diemer, Dan Locklair, William Bolcom, Alice Parker, Carl Schalk, Margaret Sandresky, Richard Proulx, Stephen Paulus, and Craig Phillips. The 2014 **AGO/ECS Publishing Award in Choral Composition** was presented to **Ivan Božičević** for his winning composition, *Kyrie eleison*. The award included a cash prize of \$2,000 and publication, both provided by the ECS Publishing Co., and a performance at the 2014 AGO National Convention in Boston. Thirty-five composers submitted pieces to the fourteenth biennial competition. The competition was judged by Carol Barnett, David Carrier, and Steven Sametz. Mr. Božičević is the first Croatian citizen ever to receive the award.

## AGO NAMES PRIZEWINNERS IN NATIONAL ORGAN COMPETITIONS

New York. The AGO is pleased to announce the results of its National Young Artists Competition in Organ Performance (NYACOP) and the National Competition in Organ Improvisation (NCOI). Competition prizewinners were recognized at the 52nd biennial AGO National Convention in Boston, Mass. The following competition prizes were awarded: **ORGAN PERFORMANCE**

First Prize - Jonathan Rudy

Second Prize - HyeHyun Sung

Third Prize - Kirk Rich

Audience Choice Prize - Jonathan Rudy

The National Young Artists Competition in Organ Performance promotes the highest level of organ performance. The competition serves as a springboard for emerging young organists, allowing them to continue to develop their performance ability by participating in the various demanding stages of this competition. Established in 1950 and held biennially, the competition is open to organists between the ages of 22 and 32. The judges for the final round were Michael Barone, Diane Meredith Belcher, and Peter Sykes.

The National Competition in Organ Improvisation advances the art of improvisation by recognizing and rewarding superior performers in the field. Improvisation is the pinnacle of achievement for a musician who can combine the elements of performance and composition simultaneously in the creation of a new work of art. Since 1990, the AGO NCOI has motivated and inspired hundreds of the most talented organists in America. Today, it is the preeminent competition in North America dedicated to preserving and advancing improvisation at the organ, and is open to all regardless of age or country of citizenship. A flourishing tradition of improvisation has always been fundamental to a truly vital musical culture. Although musical extemporization has enjoyed a rich heritage in Europe for many centuries, the art form is in perilous risk of extinction in America except among a few organists and jazz musicians. As the premier competition for organ improvisation in America, the NCOI continues to set the standard for organists seeking to demonstrate their skill in extemporaneous performance, the highest and most challenging musical art form.
