From the editor



Spring Meeting 2023

As we reported in the last Newsletter, 3/22, next year's Spring Meeting will be held in Germany once more, this time in the East, in the State of Thuringia, home turf of Johann Sebastian Bach and, along with East Frisia, perhaps the area of Germany offering the highest concentration of truly spectacular organs of all epochs up to 1939. Nearly all stations of the Bach biography until his move to Köthen lie within its borders, from his birthplace in Eisenach to the place of his ducal service in Weimar, including Ohrdruf, where he was sent to live with his oldest brother Johann Christoph after the death of their father (he was 11); Arnstadt, where he obtained his first appointment, Mühlhausen and Weimar. Erfurt, the exceptionally pleasant state capital which will be our base for the week, was also home to a branch of the Bach family; Johann Bach was the Organist of the Predigerkirche for nearly 40 years and together with his brother Christoph he was in control of the musicians guild in the city; Johann Sebastian's father Ambrosius was a member of the town band from 1667 until he moved to Eisenach.

Important information

Dates:

as mentioned above, this will be a full Spring Meeting as we used to know it. We will begin with the opening dinner on **Monday**, **10th April** at 7.00 pm. The meeting continues until the evening of **Friday**, **14th April** with the closing dinner that evening, departure on Saturday after breakfast.

Accomodation etc:

We have asked potential participants to make their own hotel arrangements this year and this seems to have worked out quite well. Most have chosen either the Radisson Blu or the Mercure. These are 220 metres apart, 3 - 5 minutes on foot.

Registration and costs:

CHAPTER MEMBERS: Registration will be informal, as usual. Once you have definitely decided to join the meeting, find yourself a place to stay and then write a mail to us to say that you have done so. We would ask you to finalise your decision by the 15th February (note: this is a little earlier than previously notified!), as we obviously need numbers for restaurant bookings, buses etc. Please use the Email address **springmeeting@agoeurope.eu** for this.

NON-MEMBERS may join us for the meeting on payment of a supplement of € 25, provided that we have spare places.

The **cost** for members will be € 140 per person, including buses and BOTH dinners. Please notify me **very soon** if you are planning not to participate in one or both of the dinners, because we have very little room to manoeuvre here!

Flying in:

Erfurt is fairly central but has no real airport of its own (it does have one, but it really only offers charter or goods flights). The nearest airport is Leipzig-Halle, but flying there is not really an option; people on international flights should simply use Frankfurt and take a train from there. The journey takes 2 1/2 to 3 hours and trains leave approximately every 30 minutes. Hotels in the inner city are about 10 - 15 minutes on foot from the railway station; the trams 2, 3, 5 and 6 will take you there and leave approx. every 3 minutes.

Itinerary - this is "final", but of course things can always come up at the last minute!

Erfurt - all walking distance, public transport is available St. Severi (Klais 1930, III/34) Dom (Schuke 1993 III/63) – *only demonstration and visit to the church, no playing (it is right next to St Severi)* St Crucis (Volckland, c. 1737, II/29) Predigerkirche (Schuke 1977, III/60; case H. Compenius d.Ä 1572 and Winterhalter 2022, II/15 plus extensions and 5 "either-or" stops in the Refectory) *not yet confirmed: Carillon concert / tour (max 10 px) Bartholomew-Tower (Anger)*

Wednesday:

Gräfenhain: Thielemann 1728 II/22

Waltershausen: Trost 1724 - 1755, III/47

Mechterstädt: Carl Christian Hoffmann, 1770. II/25

Eisenach: Georgenkirche (Bachs baptismal church) Visits to the Bach House museum and Wartburg castle. Note: unfortunately there is a Golden Wedding in the Georgenkirche at 2 pm, so there will little time to visit it. It is just a few minutes walk from there to the Bachhaus, so perhaps it will be possible to see it quickly. At the Bachhaus we can hear the instruments in a short concert. The bus will take us to the Wartburg. It is a 15 minute climb from the parking place to the Wartburg, but those who need it can use the shuttle bus service! This costs \notin 2.50.

Thursday:

Büßleben: Stertzing, 1702, II/28

Suhl, Kreuzkirche: Eilert Köhler, 1738 - 1740, II / 39

Arnstadt, Bachkirche: Reconstruktion of the Wender Organ of 1703 by Otto Hoffmann (1999), II / 21; Steinmeyer / Hoffmann, III / 55.

Visits to the Bach sites, original console of Bach's organ in the museum are possible while others play.

Friday:

Kahla: the first phase of a new organ in this little town, the birthplace of the "first protestant cantor", Johann Walter. It is only a little Positif now, but with changeable temperaments, quite interesting. Späth, 2021 (Some info: https://www.freiburgerorgelbau.de/en/organ-works/new-buildings/kahla/) Greiz: Richard Kreuzbach 1881, enlarged to III / 58 by the Jehmlich brothers 1919. Later changes reversed and full restoration by Späth, completed December 2022 Fraureuth: Silbermann, 1742, II/20

Closing dinner (currently *Zum Wenigemarkt* 13)





... if you have time to kill! Visit:

Halle / Saale: Handel museum in the house in which he grew up with collection of instruments; Marktkirche with the organ by Reichelt on which he had lessons with Zachow and the main organ with a case by Contius. Train 30 minutes.

Weimar, famous town of the classicists (Goethe and Schiller, and of course Franz Liszt) Train 15 minutes

Leipzig, Nikolaikirche, Thomaskirche, Mendelssohn house (highly recommended!), Bach museum, musical instrument collection (in the Grassimuseum) and much more! 40 minutes.

Merseburg: Cathedral with organ by Ladegast (in a case by Zacharias Thaysner). There are noon recitals every second Saturday. About 1 hour.

Naumburg: St Wenzel with the famous Hildebrandt organ, and the Romanesque cathedral. About 50 min.

Mühlhausen, where Bach had his second position. 50 min.

And as the third wise man said "There's myrrh! Much myrrh!"

News in Brief

Barry Jordan (your newsletter editor and webmaster) will retire from Magdeburg Cathedral at the end of November after over 29 years as Director of Music, during which time two new organs were built and a third fundamentally rejuvenated (three new reed stops will be installed during the course of this year), and the choir performed works ranging from the Bach Passions and the b minor Mass to Elgar's *Dream of Gerontius* and *The Apostles* by way of Poulenc's *Stabat Mater* or Stravinsky's *Symphony of Psalms*. There were also performances of his own works *Last Things* and *Die Eiche im Dom* (both can be heard here: https://soundcloud.com/user-300924996). He will take his leave with a series of concerts entitled *The long Goodbye* during the first half of the year, Messiaen's *Livre du Saint Sacrament* in October, a final recital in November and a last *Messiah* with the choir on November 25th. Also on the calendar in the cathedral this year: David Briggs plays his own transcriptions of Mahler's 5th symphony on 1st June, and Kevin Bowyer is featured on August 24th.
