News from Bernard Sanders

Bernard Sanders has been invited to spend the first two weeks of July on Rügen off the coast of northern Germany. During this time he will be responsible for the church music in Gross Zicker, Baabe and Göhren on the southeast tip of the island. In addition to regular services he will play a concert on the historic Gruneberg organ from 1860 in Gross Zicker. Gruneberg was an organ builder from Stettin (today Poland) who installed several instruments on the island in the 19th century.

In a concert celebrating the 150th Anniversary of the Church of St. Gallus in Tuttlingen, Germany, the new church musician there Constanze Rommel will conduct a program including the Concertino for Organ and Strings (European Premiere) of her predecessor Bernard Sanders, who will play the organ part himself. Also on the program is the second Organ Concerto of Rheinberger with Daniel Seeger, a native of the Tuttlingen area, as soloist.

Bernard's new organ work "Diversions" was premiered by the composer on May 19th, 2023 at the Protestant City Church (Stadtkirche) in Tuttlingen, Germany. It is more secular in nature and consists of four movements: The Color of Tomorrow, The Time of Opaque, A Sense of Lavender, and A Taste of Siena (Gymnopodie). A week later he premiered his Organ Suite "Zacchaeus the Tax Collector" in the same venue. It was composed in the Fall of 2020 and consists of five movements: Entrée, Gavotte, Interlude, Sarabande, Sortie. The story was narrated by Phline Blum, minister of the church.

The Music Office of the Diocese of Bozen-Brixen in Tirolia chose the "Deutsche Messe" by Bernard Sanders to be performed at their Diocesan-Church-Music-Day. Although Tirolia is part of Italy, the region is predominantly German-speaking. The choirs prepared the Mass individually and on April 25th, 2023 Diocesan Music Director Dominik Bernhard conducted over 600 singers, two organs and a Brass Quintet for the Pontifical Mass with Bishop Ivo Muser in the Brixen Cathedral.

I was the soloist organist for the Concerto for Organ, Harp and Strings by Howard Hanson, an American composer. Also, I was the organist for the Symphony Op. 25 in G-Minor of Marcel Dupre.

Jennifer Chou looks back

I first joined the AGO as a student at Northwestern University (IL). Wolfgang Rübsam said we should join, and most of us dutifully did. When I left for Paris, I told Maggie Kemper - faculty member at Northwestern who also was the North Shore Chapter Dean and the AGO President during those years, that I would like to continue my AGO membership but not sure if it would be relevant anymore. It was then she mentioned the existence of the European Chapter to me!

It took a while to work out "where" is this European Chapter, as "these people" were mostly in the Netherlands and Germany which felt irrelevant to me. Anyway, I joined so I could keep reading my TAO.

One day Judy Riefel-Lindel wrote to invite me to a "Dutch Treat", which later became the first Spring Meeting on record. As a penniless student, I took the slow bus from Paris to Amsterdam and caught a train to Arnhem where I stayed with a friend. Each morning I packed a sandwich and took the train to Zutphen to meet the tiny group of members for the day. But this trip consolidated my long lasting relationship with the European Chapter. When I moved to Australia, I thought I'll finally move on. I stayed as a "Chapter Friend" because I wasn't ready to disconnect with "these lovely people" yet, but it didn't last long and I renewed as a full member again.

Now 25 years since Paris, it is the friendship and colleagueship of "these lovely people" that I treasure most highly.

Joining the Spring Meeting is my perfect excuse in the name of "Professional Development" to

travel to spend time with "these lovely people", when both timing of Down Under school term break and international airfare permit.

It really was the highlight of the year to me that I was able to join the Spring Meeting at the last minute this year, despite the tour bus made me unusually dizzy (the sinus problem I was experiencing aggravated the situation) that I opted out 1.5 days of the visits just in case.

This summer, after some 5 recitals had been postponed from 2020 due to Covid, and one other cancelled anyway by the fire before Easter in 2019 (yes Paris it was), I travelled to Europe for a second time to perform 7 concerts, 2 of them lunchtime recitals, and one duo concert with a trumpeter in which we will perform Okna (Windows) by Petr Eben, a work that I love playing ever since I found a few trumpeters to have fun with me! The greatest difficulty was to get back to practice!! Two years complete closure of the Australian borders - including 266 days of full lockdown in Melbourne in 6 blocks that won Melbourne the title "the most locked down city in the world", with the longest one that lasted over 110 days - with absolutely nothing to look forward to really killed my motivation to practice, no matter how resilience I was. When my recital dates started to loom on the horizon earlier this year, I suddenly realized how long I haven't played practiced for concerts, it took some work to wake the fingers.

To suit the various organs from the short octave in Buxtehude's church in Helsingnør Sct. Mariæ to the 5-manual central console in Hamburg St Michaelis which plays 3 very different organs, I have included works by Bach, Böhm, Bruhns, Buxtehude, Eben, Heiller, Messiaen, Morricone, Mozart, Pachelbel, Præstholm, Vierne, and Wammes.

I sometimes want to stop making these expensive long haul "concert trips" to and fro Europe that rarely even cover my expense, but whenever I think of my students in Melbourne, I reiterated to myself, "I need to keep doing this for them." Aspire to inspire before I expire.

Francine Maté informs us of their upcoming Bach Festival (August 2023) and writes:

"Our 2021 Bach Festival was all Virtual. Our last live Bach Festival was our 26th Bach Festival in July, 2019. Bernie Sanders' outstanding recital closed that series."
